



CORDILLERA GOLF CLUB

Cordillera features three 18-hole, championship golf courses, designed by the greatest names in golf — Jack Nicklaus, Hale Irwin and Tom Fazio — as well as an exclusive Dave Pelz Short Course. Challenging courses, breathtaking scenery and state-of-the-art facilities make Cordillera one of the world’s premier golf destinations. Cordillera’s four courses are semi-private, however guests of the Lodge & Spa at Cordillera may play during their stay. *Golf Digest* magazine in 2006 named Cordillera among the publication’s “Top 75 Golf Resorts in North America” rankings. The next year, the Lodge & Spa at Cordillera jumped five spots to No. 22 in the same poll. Additionally, *Golf Magazine* included Cordillera’s Tom Stickney II in its annual “Top 100 Teachers” for 2006-07. Stickney, director of golf instruction for The Club at Cordillera, was chosen from among America’s 25,000 golf professionals.

The Mountain Course

7,413 yards; par 72; elevation 8,250 feet

Open June through September

A Hale Irwin Signature Design inspired by the rolling hills and postcard setting, the Mountain Course is simply exhilarating. Capturing the feel of the landscape was especially important to Irwin, who grew up in Colorado. The three-time U.S. Open champion was committed to preserving the area's inherent natural qualities while creating an extraordinary course. Formerly a working ranch, the land spans ridges, meadows and forests, bringing into play a variety of challenges.

The Summit Course

7,530 yards; par 72; elevation 9,000 feet

Open June through September

A Jack Nicklaus Signature Design crafted on 190 mountaintop acres at 9,000 feet above sea level, the Summit Course takes advantage of the natural, rolling terrain of sage and spruce-covered hills with stunning views of the Rocky Mountains. Nicklaus created additional open space to protect the community's natural beauty while improving hiking and recreational access to 3 million acres of the neighboring White River National Forest. During a visit to the course in 2007, Nicklaus and Senior Designer Jim Lipe determined a number of the greens carried too much slope. Construction began that fall, as part of a one-year project, to make those greens more receptive to approach shots. The course will still feature unique challenges and unparalleled views, while golfers say the overall experience has become even more enjoyable.

The Valley Course

7,005 yards; par 71; elevation 7,200 feet

Open April through October

A Tom Fazio Signature Design with high-mountain-desert topography, the Valley Course is dramatically different from the Mountain and Summit Courses. Lower in elevation by 2,100 feet and blessed with primarily southern exposure, it offers an extended playing season. Fazio's goal was to incorporate the natural terrain while enhancing the beauty of the area and ensuring an abundance of open space. The course's wide-open fairways do just that.

The Short Course

1,252 yards; par 27; elevation 7,800 feet

Open June through September

A Dave Pelz Signature Design, the Short Course is one of only two in the world. It integrates Pelz's own short game philosophy. While each hole is less than 130 yards long, they all feature challenging shots and tight bunkering. The 10-hole course lies high on the mountain, so it provides a fabulous view of the Vail Valley. Sophisticated enough for serious players who wish to develop a stronger short game, it also provides a fun, relaxed golf experience for every ability and age level.
